We started in 1994 around a kitchen table, looking for ways to improve the health of rural Bolivians. Ten years later, we have created a partnership that has prevented hundreds of untimely deaths, made education available to thousands of children, and built a foundation for a better future.

| No Access to Health Care: Rural Bolivians lack access to affordable care. High cost limits availability of modern equipment, supplies. | Create a community health care infrastructure that will survive over the long term. Cut costs by stocking with surplus US medical supplies. | Built and staffed 45 clinics from 1997 to 2004. By 2011 we'll have built another 90. Shipped 1.2 million pounds of supplies since 1995. |
| Infant Death: 300 of every 1,000 rural children die before age 1, largely because of preventable illness. | Provide health education, routine vaccinations and responsive acute care. | Vaccinated 100,000 moms and children in Mano a Mano clinics from 1997 to 2004. 80,000 took our health education classes. |
| Dangerous Births: 650 rural Bolivian women die for every 100,000 live births — Latin America's highest maternal death rate. | Offer pre- and post-natal care and hygienic birth assistance. | Of 2,900 births in our clinics since 1997, zero maternal or infant deaths. |
| Tainted Water: Contaminated water exposes villagers to disease. | Construct public bathrooms and showers with washing facilities and teach villagers to use them. | Completed 13 bathroom/shower projects. Another 33 requested. |
| Limited Education: Many rural areas have poor schools and cannot attract teachers. Low education leads to more poverty and ill health. | Build rural schools with decent housing that attracts and retains teachers. | Built schools with adjacent teacher housing in 12 communities. Another 34 requested. |
| Dangerous Travel: Accident rates are among the world's highest. Many villages are accessible only by foot. Markets are out of reach. | Open and improve roads. Construct aircraft landing strips. | Improved 155 miles of roads connecting villages to main roads. Built 9 landing strips in remote villages. |
